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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Smt. Kamla Devi Gauridutt Mittal Mahila Mahavidyalaya was established on 14 November 1981 with the vision to "Empower women education" specially belonging from rural areas in the memory of late Smt. Kamla Devi and late Shri. Gauridutt Mittal. The college was started with the strength of 15 girls and today more than 800 students are enrolled in the college.

The college is situated in the heart of the city, inbuilt in the plot area of 2 acres and infrastructure area of approx 6000 Mts. We encourage students not only for studies but also to develop their all round personalities.

The college is enriched with infrastructure, dedicated, qualified and experienced teaching staff. The college is known for it's academic excellence and high standards. The students of the college adorn university merit list with their thumping results in all streams at UG & PG level. Besides various courses in humanities, commerce and science, the college also offers courses in computer science like RSCIT, CCC, etc. which are mandatory for any type of competition exams. Presently, at the UG level B.A., B.Com. and B.Sc(Maths\Biology), at PG level M.Com.(ABST) and M.A.(Geography) and B.A.B.Ed / B.Sc.B.Ed (4 years integrated course). and M.Sc. (chemistry) has also been started from current session. We are also planning to start M.Com.(EAFM), M.Sc (Zoology), M.Sc. (Botany) and law courses.

Year 2020 presented unprecedented challenges due to COVID-19 pandemic. Our faculty responded swiftly to the challenges as classes were shifted to the online mode (on Google meet, Zoom, Youtube, etc.). and provided notes in PDF and PPT format.

As part of its commitment towards society the college organized a vaccination camp within the campus. our trust also distributed essential items like food, Ayurvedic Kadha, PPE Kit in the surrounding where people were suffering from corona severely. In our special scheme "SWASTH BALIKA ABHIYAN" Mittal Trust Hospital provides free eye and dental check-up to the enrolled students and some relaxation in the consultation fees for their parents. Even during the pandemic, our college NSS students have played a significant role in spreading awareness on social media and distributing masks.

However the college develops a planned academic structure to fulfill the aim of development of students.

Implementation of curricular aspects of college is well organized, planned and systematic. Our faculty members are technologically enabled and along with this rich infrastructure and library make it possible for students to easily involve themselves in teaching learning process.

For effective implementation of curricular we adopt some measures like-classroom teaching, use of ICT, Field work, Projects, Quiz competition, Educational tours etc. and for regular assessment of students, class test, assignments and discussion sessions are organized.

- Teaching, learning and student evaluation are very important part in the growth of any higher educational institution.
- Teaching learning process is important for the increasing improvement in students' performance in all types of higher university exams competitive exams, placements, and admission in research in central and state universities over the last five years.
- Mostly faculty members are well qualified with good teaching experience .Some of them are awarded with Ph.D. degree whereas some are pursuing it.
- Internal tests are conducted by the college to evaluate the academic needs of students, Micro and Macro teaching sessions in education department, seminars, group discussions, creative writing competitions, webinars, question-answer verbal sessions, assignments, and classroom activities/interactions programs and laboratory practical are recognized through instructive knowledge analysis.
- The evaluation is transparent and is carried out through quarterly tests, poster making Competition, assignments, practicals and presentations on offline/online platforms.

- Students have been achieving good rankings in university examinations at both the graduate and post graduate levels in Science, Commerce and Arts subjects.
- Students with smart boards, LCD projectors, and screens have access to e-learning platforms for computer-aided learning (Internet, PowerPoint presentations) at the ICT level.
- During the COVID-19 pandemic, all the faculty members had prepared subject-specific e-contents, videos, and assignments for theory and practical that had been shared with students via teacher-specific playlists on online resources like zoom meeting and Google meets classrooms.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The Journey of our institute has always been full of innovation. Smt. Kamla Devi Gauridutt Mittal Mahila Mahavidhayala evolved its five-Piller educational ideology (*Panchmukhi shiksha*) and incorporated Physical, Practical, Aesthetic, Moral and Intellectual aspect into each of its programme to develop an all round balanced and integrated personality of students.

As on today total 29 research papers and reviews article published by faculty members in Last five years. During last five years our college has organised 5 webinars and 1 FDP. Our college administration encouraged teachers to attend conference, seminar, FDP and workshops etc. to do so college provide leave.

The institution adopts new innovating teaching methods for the better understanding and knowledge development of the students. During Covid-19 pandemic all academic activities were online. In this period also we organized webinars, awareness programs and yoga class in online mode using zoom platform. We also organized science fest and science exhibition to encourage and motivate students take part in science activities.

The students from all departments actively participate in social service activities leading to their overall development. The college runs NSS, Bharat scout and rover ranger and Red ribbon Club .Through these schemes, the institution undertakes various extension of the NSS and red ribbon unit volunteers , who regularly engaged in serve to the society.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- This college was formally inaugurated on November 14, 1981 by lighting the lamp by the Mr. Chandanmal Ji Baid then Minister of Education and Finance (State Government).
- Initially The College was started in Mittal Guest House on that time and from 8th December 1984 it was shifted to the grand building constructed for the college by Mittal charities.
- The management is continously improving the infrastructural facilities which would facilitate teaching learning process.
- The college offers B.A., B.Com. B.Sc (Maths\Biology) and B.A.B.Ed/B.Sc.B.Ed (4 years integrated course) at the UG level, M.Com. (ABST) and M.A. (Geography) at PG level and M.Sc. (chemistry) has also been started from current session. All the programs have separate classroom with adequate facilitates for teaching.
- College campus having well furnished 42 class rooms with proper lighting, and ventilation. Apart from that we also have 3 smart class rooms, 1 seminar hall and well equipped 7 laboratories for practical subjects like physics, zoology, botany, chemistry, home science, geography and computer etc.).
- Our institution has Administrative office, Staff room, one room each for NSS, RRC and different type of cells like Women Cell, Counseling cell etc. we have Common Room for students, Cafeteria, pure drinking water facility and wash rooms.
- We have a vast and well furnished rich library having more than 15000 books, it provides access to News Papers, Magazines and all reference collections including dictionaries, atlas, biographies, Yearbooks, Encyclopedias, competition books and reports etc. There are more than 2000 books available in the Book Bank for the needful students free of charge. Recently college has subscribed N List portal for extending access to E resources
- The College has adequate facilities for indoor and outdoor games. College organizes indoor games like Table Tennis, Chess and Carrom etc. and outdoor games like Kabaddi, Kho- Kho, Volley Ball and Cricket Etc.
- Indoor sports facilities (Chess, badminton, carom) and outdoor games Athletics, kabaddi, volleyball,

- Uninterrupted electricity is ensured in campus with the help of 40 KW Generator and 32.5KW solar system.
- In IT infrastructure the college is equipped with more than 50 computers for students and administration and all are connected with internet.
- The campus is pollution free, smoke free and environment friendly Our college provides well furnished staff quarters.

Student Support and Progression

The college is well known for its well-established student mentoring and support system in this rural region of Rajasthan. We provide various types of mentoring and support services to students which are crucial for their overall personality development. These can be enlisted as

Financial Support: The institute publishes details of various scholarships on its web page and also on college notice board. The Scholarship committee helps the students to fill their form properly and on time.

Zero Tolerance and Ragging Free Campus: The whole campus is under the observation of CCTV camera. Separate committees are formed to give healthy, friendly and safe atmosphere to the students.

Medical Assistance to Students: College works on "Swasth Balika Abhiyan Scheme"

A first aid box is available at the college to tackle the cases of emergency. Free eye and dental check-up facility is provided to the regular students in Mittal hospital. Health experts are invited to guide the students for various health issues.

Academic Counseling: In the beginning of the academic session different admission committees are constituted. The committee members guide students about how to apply, how to select subject combination and also addresses queries of students and their parents. Separate helpdesk is also appointed to assist newcomers.

Career Guidance and Placement Career counseling and placement cell and women cell consult the students about career, aims and goals of their life. The committee members not only guide the students but also timely inform and help students about related employment, opportunities, competitive exams and placement opportunities.

Skill Creation: Various Co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are performed. Educational tours are organized. The motivational speakers are also invited for the soft skill enhancement keeping in consideration the rural background of the students.

Students' Participation in Various National And International Competitions: To promote participation of students in extracurricular and Co-curricular activities the IQAC, Sports Committee, Cultural Committee and Admission Committee of the college checkout the policies and strategies. They ensure that student should enroll themselves in at least one activity.

its guideline and norms in both letter and spirit.
Multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary are integral to
holistic education and our college believes that
students should be imparted an all round education so
that they become multidimensional rather than Unidimensional. Our college provides student's
environments rich in Knowledge and supportive for
their Extra-curricular interests. For holistic
development of students we focus on multiple
dimensions like - Physical, Mental, Social, Emotional
and intellectual. In present year 8 programs from

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Science, Commerce and Humanities streams are being taught in the college. The college follows the Learning Outcomes Based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) prescribed by the Maharaja Ganga Singh University, Bikaner (Raj). Under LOCF General Hindi, General English, Elementary Computer studies & Environmental studies are compulsory subjects which are taught in First year of all UG classes. Further optional paper is an offered to students wherein they study a subject of their choice from any discipline this enhances their learning. In order to give students a wider exposure, college level invites Guest lectures and special talks are organized by different departments which gives student's a deeper understanding of their disciplines. Our college believes that student's need more than just a strong foundation core curriculum they need to be supported by innovative Pedagogy experiential Learning & inclusion practices.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Under the prescribe LOCF curriculum being taught currently, there are credits assigned to papers which are not transferable but with the upcoming implementation of NEP in the upcoming academic year students will create a bank of credits which will be transferable and interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary in nature. Regarding the implementation of Academic Bank of Credits, the institution has to wait for the academic council regulation prescribed by the MGSU. MGSU is in process of drafting UG & PG curriculum of all courses based on NEP (National Education Policy). Being an affiliated college of Maharaja Ganga Singh University, Bikaner (Raj), and our college follows the norms laid down by the University in due course of Time. Students will also have multiple Entry and Exit options as per their requirements. The pedagogical approach of the institution is student centric where the faculties' pedagogical approaches are constructivist, inquiry-based, reflective, collaborative and integrative. Summative and Formative assessments and assignments are used to evaluate the student's learning outcome.

3. Skill development:

The college has initiated programmes to improve students' skill and knowledge in extra curriculum fields and disciplines. For fulfilling the purpose our college conducts a Rapid Basic Computer course which is cost free for faculty and students. The

college has continuously offered opportunities for students to develop their skills according to the changing needs. The college conducts various seminars, webinars, awareness program Science Exhibition, Science Events & Art and craft Exhibitions for the students. Furthermore, student's skills are further augmented by frequent interaction with alumni and industry experts. This enhances their preparedness for the world outside the college. The Institution is also planning to introduce some Vocational courses like PGDCA.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

The curriculum being taught under LOCF gives students an in-depth understanding of our rich cultural heritage, including its language, culture and knowledge. Keeping in mind the student's diversity in class, the faculty appropriately chooses a Pedagogy delivery style that meets the need of the students. For this teaching is done in bilingual modes to ensure effective understanding among students of the concepts being taught. Students are provided reference material and notes in Hindi and English. Bilingual medium books of most courses are available in college Library for reference. The students, particularly in Humanities are introduced frequently to classical Indian philosophical texts and literature. Our students often give performances based on classical dance and culture and introduce the other students to the history of Indian culture. Hindi Diwas, Rajasthan Diwas, Matra Bhasha Diwas, Basant Panchmi, Yoga Diwas, Gandhi Jayanti, Ganesh Chaturthi, Krishna Janmashtmi, Navratri, etc. are celebrated by the college annually where students participate to appreciate the culture, heritage, and languages of India.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

• Smt. Kamla Devi Gauridutt Mittal Mahila Mahavidyalaya is affiliated to **Maharaja Ganga Singh University, Bikaner**.

- M. G. S. University, Bikaner conducts all the examination for affiliated HEI.
- HEI follow all the terms as per university rule.
- The enrollment application form is filled online by candidates along with examination application form on the website of university.
- Time table and Admit card is uploaded on website by university and HEI inform the students about all the information through notice board and whatsapp groups timely.
- University examine the students by **Internal exam** (**Practical exam**) and **External exam** (**Theory exam**).
- In case of internal (practical) exam university nominates the examiner panel for evaluation.
- The question paper is set by external examiner as per the pattern given by university of Bikaner. Both internal and external examiners play equal role in allotting marks to the students without any bias. The external examiner uploads the marks to allotted website by himself in a fully confidential manner. One copy of the marks is send to the university and one is kept by principal. This process is kept confidential.
- For final examination the question papers are dispatched by the university to the exam center. On receipt of the question paper at the exam centre, an acknowledgement is given by the centre superintendent.
- The envelopes containing the question papers is opened in front of the examiners in the examination hall room after examining the stamp on the envelopes and seeing them by the witnesses.
- A committee is formed to look in to the pre examination process such as intimating the student through website, SMS, telephone calls and whatsApp groups. Thus HEI ensure 100% participation of students in examination.
- The committee verifies the attendance list of the student prepared by the university.
- HEI involves administration staff and teaching staff to complete the entire pre and post examination process for smooth conduct of examination.
- HEI appoints a committee called **Flying squad** to take rounds and to prevent unfair means in the examination.
- The information of the university Act related to prevention of copying and use of unfair means is displayed on the notice board at the examination centre.
- HEI also have **CCTV** installed in all the class rooms.
- The cases reported under unfair means are always NIL.
- The answer book is sealed by exam committee and the university collects it.
- HEI also receives answer books for evaluation for assessment from the university. Principal of HEI allocates the answer sheets by appointing experienced faculties as an examiner.
- University of Bikaner has established revaluation system. If the student is not satisfied with evaluated score she can apply online to the university through the portal. HEI inform the students above this procedure by displaying on the notice board.
- HEI after receiving the result from university verify whether all internal marks are incorporated in the result sheet before issuing the mark sheet to the student.
- HEI provide the **Examination centre for Non collegiate** student so that they can continue their studies smoothly.

- At the beginning of the session, the lecturers inform the students about the objectives of the entire

Response:

Smt. Kamla Devi Gauridutt Mittal Mahila Mahavidyalaya is situated in the heart of Sardarshahar city. The HEI was established in 1981 to develop academic excellence among women. The HEI has spacious building with adequate facilities for academic and co curricular activities. The physical facilities in the college are as follows:-

- The main building has administrative office, principal's room, staff room & reception/Inquiry office.
- There are 42 classrooms, 9 smart classrooms with interactive boards and 7 laboratories. Each laboratory individually is equipped with at least one computer and internet facility.
- ICT lab is equipped with 42 computers. There are two Internet connections of 100 mbps speed, one for library and one for administrative office. Computer lab has one projector along with a white screen.
- Adequate water taps on each wing/floor, 4 water coolers and one Water dispenser.
- RO water plant for clean drinking water.
- The college also has underground water tank for water storage and a submersible tube well.
- We have one Solar panel of 32.5 KW, which is to promote energy conservation.
- Two Biometric machines have been arranged for the taking attendance of students and staff member.
- Keeping in mind the safety and hygiene of women a sanitary napkin machine has been installed in the college.
- Our college extending the online facilities and E-Mitra Kiosk has been set in the HEI.
- To combat power cut situations the institute possesses a 40 KW Generator lodged in the main building.

Facilities for Cultural Activities:-

HEI has a spacious hall and an open ground where most of the extracurricular activities like essay, poster, slogan, painting, photography, poetry, drama, singing and other competitions as well as cultural activities like solo & group songs and dance, plays mono acting etc are organized.

- There is a green room for preparations of cultural events.
- There is also provision of mementoes and certificates for winners.

Facilities for Sports:-

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- The HEI has adequate facilities for indoor games and outdoor games. Various outdoor sports such as khokho, kabbadi, volleyball, athletics etc are organized in the open ground and chess, carom etc are conducted indoor.
- Most of the students of this college are from a rural background do well in their academic and also they perform well in sports too. The college sports committee takes care of various team selections, helding competitions, taking teams to different places during tournaments at state & national level events.
- HEI conduct Yoga sessions in the open ground.

Facilities of Library:-

The HEI has well managed library with reading room for the students and staff. The library size is 26 x 79.6 feet. It has 16710 books, subscription of 10 magazines and 6 newspapers and computer systems for internet access. Recently HEI has also taken subscription of N-List portal.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

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adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

The list of books attached speaks volume about the college library. The HEI offers good reading material in the form of books, periodicals, encyclopedias, magazines, newspapers etc. it is a place that is used for acquiring knowledge and gathering information. The college library is neat and clean and with comfortable furniture and air cooler, it provides a peaceful and scholarly environment which is an incentive to study. The library staff is also very co-operative and renders all sorts of help needed by the students and faculty equally. HEI has qualified Librarian. The students are issued library cards and besides reading in the library they can also get the books issued carry them along and return them after reading.

- HEI has subscribed for N-List to motivate staff for research work and to enhance their knowledge.
- Number of books in library are 14871 and books in book bank are 1839.
- The college library has a good collection of rare books. Books that have enhanced value.
- The rare book and old book collection in the library contains books on varied 3 subjects viz. history, religion and literature.
- Students are asked to deposit books 15 days before examination. If student want to keep the books during examination they have to deposit amount as security, which is fully refundable after books deposit.
- The students of HEI are allowed for pre-examination preparation in library's reading room, so that they can prepare for the examination in peaceful environment.
- General knowledge books are available for students to support them to prepare for competitive examinations.
- There are 3 computers in library with Internet facility, one for librarian and 2 for students and staff.
- Library committee regularly visits nearby central libraries for new ideas and suggestions for updation of Library. HEI is planning for automation of library.

- HEI has two Computer Labs.
- HEI has total 58 computers, from which 49 computers are used by students and rest are used for admin work and faculty members. Lab has inverter and battery power-backup for uninterrupted electricity supply.
- HEI has 2 internet connections (Optical fiber) with the speed of 100 mbps.
- Computer lab is fully connected with the high speed (100 mbps) internet and respective departments also have computer and internet which is accessible for the students as well as teachers.
- Computers in the lab have all the necessary and useful software. Students of the college use computers according to the time tables.
- HEI has nine smart class rooms equipped with have one computer, smart board and a projector.
- These smart classrooms used by the students during the PPT presentation as well as online seminar & classes.
- Lecturers use the ICT tools for effective teaching.
- ICT tools also help teachers to provide latest information on the topics taught and help them to upgrade their knowledge. Learners enjoy learning through smart boards as it makes them very interactive.
- College library have two computer systems with the internet accessible for the student for taking online classes and downloading study material from the internet.
- CCTV cameras installed in every wing, department and room in the college. Its main screen is

placed in the principal's room for constant observation.

- HEI has one intercom system, which connects each department and makes the communication easy.
- HEI has issued chargeable compact speakers to faculty members for class room teaching.
- HEI has Audio system with Mike for regular functions and cultural activities.
- Two biometric machines have been installed for monitoring attendance of teaching, non teaching staff and for student also. There is a centralized attendance management system to record the biometric attendance of faculty and student.
- Online teaching is done by providing learning content in video format on you-tube channel, Notes in PDF,PPT and image content is shared through WhatsApp group of students and also uploaded on college website.
- Student record, Fees record and other database regarding the students are managed by online software.
- HEI academic office has latest configuration computers. Presently we have b/w printer, color printer, scanners and power backup facility.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

Response:

Smt. Kamla Devi Gauridutt Mittal Mahila Mahavidyalaya has adequate and effective strategies for financial management and resource mobilization and utilization. The main financial sources of income of the HEI are the annual fee received from the girl students and the grant received from the Mittal Charitable Trust. Some of the financially weak girl students are provided with a partial amount of fee by some trusts. The entire fee received from the girl students is deposited in the bank account of the institution. This amount is used to provide educational and physical resources to the girl students, which are as follows –

- Salary of Teaching, Non teaching and Supportive staff.
- Purchase of Books and periodicals for the library
- Arrangement of resources for modern teaching technology
- o Sports accessories, lab equipments and chemicals
- Expenses on Co-Curricular activities
- Repairs and maintenance expenses
- o Generator fuel, Electricity and solar plant maintenance
- Construction of additional classrooms and purchase of Furniture
- Staff and students welfare
- o Office expenses and CCTV camera Maintenance Etc.

Before Commencement of financial year a statement of budgeted expenses are made by the principle considering various recurring and non recurring expenses of all departments. The entire financial accounting of the institute is completely transparent and systematic, for which the organization gets its financial statements and income-expenditure audited every year. Two units of NSS are running in the college, for which the budget is received from the state government. It is used by the institution to ensure the participation of girl students in social service works. This develops the spirit of social cooperation and development among the girl students.

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6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

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The HEI has Constituted Internal Quality Assurance Cell from last academic year. In addition to the traditional teaching method, IQAC emphasized the **use of ICT** to develop modern teaching techniques and adopted resources like **online teaching**, **YouTube**, **PPT**, **Educational video**, which modernized the teaching method and created interest in education among the students.

To develop innovation in academic quality, IQAC has conducted **guest lecturers**, **education visit**, **industrial tour**, **group discussion**, **quiz program** in the college. In order to provide practical knowledge to the students coming from rural areas, a program like "Science behind Magic" has been organized by the Science Department. College administration has been proposed from time to time by IQAC to form new **committees and new schemes to improve internal quality**. In order to promote research activities, the IQAC has formed a research department to promote research activities and encouraged the staff members to participate more and more in research related activities. In order to conduct new courses smoothly in the college, the IQAC presented a proposal for **building expansion** before the College Management Committee, which was considered and accepted by the Management Committee in the interest of the college and the students.

In order to improve the academic quality of college students, in the last session IQAC conducted the **internal examination** systematically and reviewed the results. Our college vision is to promote girls education in all areas and segments of society as a sole provider of girls education since 1981 where dreaming of girls education was an impossible task especially in that area where schooling was also not completely allowed for girls and gender difference was at extreme level.

Since the day of establishment our college is dedicated to promote gender equity and women education and their overall development.

To promote gender equity and social responsibilities various measures are taken from time to time such as:

Safety:

- For safety of students and to provide a safe environment a **Women Cell** has been made under which various activities such as guest lecture, self defense classes, awareness program etc.
- Whole campus is under **Electronic Surveillance** through advanced CCTV cameras covering the front and back portion of our college campus.
- To cope up with the hindrances that come in between the students education "Garima Peti (Box)" is also available for students where they can give information about the problems which is monitored by Women Cell time to time.
- A Discipline Committee is also formed to provide a safe and peaceful environment to the students which takes regular2-3 rounds within the college campus on daily basis to maintain discipline.
 Anti- Ragging Committee assures the security of each and every student to provide ragging free environment.
- For safety of girls students **Sanitary Pad Machine** is installed in campus itself which also monitored under women cell.
- For promotion of gender equity and work place safety, many awareness camps, dramas, presentations have been held on various occasions.

COUNSELLING AND COMMONROOM:

- A college **Common Room** is the place where students feel completely free and relaxed. The students may play various indoor games, meet other students and thus may socialize here.
- Our college provides a spacious and comfortable common room facility for healthy recreation. The only thing is that the students can utilize their time properly.
- Counseling plays a very important role in guiding students and educating them about their interests and appropriate career choice for this our college has formed **Career Counseling Cell** and even staff members provides personal counseling during admission process and on other occasions.
- For counseling regular newspaper cuttings of competition and vacancies of different field is provided to students through display on **Notice Board.**

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- International Women Day i.e. 8 March, on this day students are made aware of their rights so that they can overcome any situation in life. Similarly, National Girl Child Day is also celebrated with full enthusiasm.
- Career based **guest lectures** are organised in all streams time to time.
- Many events like Holi, Cultural Week, Sports Week, Freshers Party, Dandia Party, Annual Function, Farewell Party, NSS Camps are also organized in college as co-curricular activities.
- Computer quiz, General Knowledge competitions etc. are organized in the college as curricular activities.
- Counseling on some special issues like girl's education, women development, religious upliftment, emotional stability etc is done through lectures and programs by special guests.

- 1. Title of the Practice
- Upliftment of slum area "Ram nagar".
- 2.Objectives:
- Under the auspices of NSS, **Smt. Kamla Devi Gauridutt Mittal Mahila Mahavidyalaya** students have dedicated themselves for the upliftment of the slum area of **Ram Nagar**. During their periodic visit, the volunteers of NSS work at the ground level to make the people aware about the importance of health, hygiene and education.
- Under this practice our sole aim is to make the people improve their living standard by changing

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their mentality and developing their approach towards life, health, hygiene and education.

• 3.The Context:

• Many challenges are present in front of our NSS volunteers and officers. The people in the slum area are very resistive to improve their living standard and give way to progressive thinking. The slum area of Ram Nagar has been an economically backward area with no proper basic facilities for living.

• 4.Practice:

• The volunteers of NSS spread awareness regarding government schemes like Bhamashah card, Aadhar card etc. made by the government in the slum area. Distributed stationery items to the children and explained the importance of education to them. Students showed the importance of health and hygiene by working hard to spread cleanliness in the slum area. They also made the people aware about the harmful effects of open defecation and requested people to avoid such practice in order to make the area clean. Volunteer also helped them to introduce many more social activities for their social upliftment.

• 5.Evidence of success:

The local people, government officials and ward members of municipality have praised the efforts of our students in this area. According to them, our students of **Smt. Kamla Devi Gauridutt Mittal Mahila Mahavidyalaya** have inspired the children to be regular in their studies and pay more attention towards their health and hygiene. The people of the slum area have been benefited by the government schemes because of the awareness provided by our students. People have started giving more attention towards the cleanliness of their surroundings. "Nukkad Natak" presented by our students have made the people aware about the wrong practices present in the society.

• 6.Problems encountered and resources required:

Due to limitation of funds and lack of education among them, we are unable to help more needy people.

- Best Practice 2
- 1.Title of the Practice
- Aid provided to financially weak students.
- 2.Objectives:
- Smt. Kamla Devi Gauridutt Mittal Mahila Mahavidyalaya is a dream destination for the students who are needy but are ready to work hard for their bright future. The college sincerely believes to promote girls education without any type of hindrance.
- Irrespective of caste and creed, the college provides financial help to needy students on the basis of their weak financial conditions through some collaboration with some private trusts. On behalf of the college also the needy students get the required help. Our college has provided financial assistance to those students who were facing financial problems and lost family members during pandemic (corona).

• 3.The Context:

• There are several challenges to design and implement this objective. To decide the eligibility of the individual applicant for this concession is the major problem, Due to the excess of application for request of scholarships. The college has formed a committee to identify the students who really require financial help but the main problem that was faced was of deciding appropriate selection criteria.

• 4. The Practice:

• The students are given concession in fees through various means. The students as well as their

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parents are encouraged by the institution for girl education and women empowerment by concession in fees. As the college lacks means of transportation for the students, the fees concession is helpful for the students who come from remote places through their own sources or by public transport. The Fee Concession Committee of the college works in coordination with the principal and shortlists the needy students and grants the fee concession. The needy students are provided the concession through Akhil Bharat Varshiya Marwari Agarwal Jaatiya Kosh, Brijmohan Saraf (Trust), Ganpatrai Sukhlal Jaisansaria Foundation, Sardarshahar Nagarik Parishad, Delhi, Saini Seva Samaj, Acharya Mahapragya Janam Shatabdi (Trust), Shri Ayurved Prachar Sanstha, Mumbai, Mrs. Vibha Mittal & Mr. Kishore Mittal and Mittal Charities, Mumbai. These trusts have always helped the needy students.

• 5.Evidence of success:

- During the session 2017-18, the above mentioned trusts, provided scholarship for 165 needy students of Rs.7,93,900.
- During the session 2018-19, the above mentioned trusts, provided scholarship for 81 needy students of Rs.4,09,500.
- During the session 2019-20, the above mentioned trusts, provided scholarship for 156 needy students of Rs.5,12,800.
- During the session 2020-21, the above mentioned trusts, provided scholarship for 394 needy students of Rs.9,49,500.
- During the session 2021-22, the above mentioned trusts, provided scholarship for 387 needy students of Rs.8,81,000.
- During the session 2022-23, the above mentioned trusts, provided scholarship for 427 needy students of Rs.8,54,000.
- Mittal Charities, Mumbai, played the major role in helping the needy students by providing the larger portion of scholarships as well as grants to them.

• 6.Problems encountered and resources required:

- The college has increased the volume of assistance to our students over the years. The major problem is that there are limited resources whereas the number of needy students is very high. Although time to time various trusts and foundations come forward to help the needy students and in turn help the institution in empowering the women but still according to the number of needy students the available resources are not sufficient. So, Mittal Charities, Mumbai, comes forward and gives the lion's share of granting scholarships to the needy students.
- To grant scholarships to the needy students, we have made a committee which works on certain selection criteria such as income of parents, number of earning members, past academic performance etc.

A well-educated, well-cultured and healthy girl helps to form a new society which is the immediate requirement of time. Good education and knowledge of rich culture can only survive for long in a healthy mind which in turn resides in a healthy body.

So last but not the least is the importance of good health.

Our institution has always played an important role in girls' education so how could it neglect the health aspect of girls.

Under "Swasth Balika Abhiyan" scheme it has done various works to improve the health of girls. They are

- 1. Free Dental and Eye Check-up for students.
- 2. Free Health advice by health experts.
- 3. Free Corona vaccination within college campus.
- 4. Awareness about importance of Yoga.

Our college has always worked hard for empowering women in all the spheres of life. Health of women can't be neglected at any cost so our institution has paid special attention on this point. The institution is trying to leave no stone unturned in the matter of women health.

1. Free Dental and Eye Check-up for students:

Under "Swasth Balika Abhiyan", our college has joined hands with Seth Surajmal Gauridutt Mittal Eye Hospital and K. G. Mittal Dental Clinic under Mittal Charities to improve the health of our girl students. The health benefit is not only limited to the girl students but it also covers their parents. The proposal was made in the session 2018-19 but it came into practice from the session 2019-20. The students are given full concession whereas their parents are given fifty percent concession in treatment fees.

The students are given two kinds of coupons i.e. **pink** and **yellow** color along with the admission forms. The pink colored coupon stands for eye check up whereas yellow colored coupon stands for dental check up.

The data of the students registered for the eye and dental checkup is as follows:

In the beginning i.e. session **2019-20**, about **55** students and their parents took the benefit of eye and dental check up facility.

During the session 2020-21, about 80 students and their parents were benefited whereas in the session 2021-22, about 120 students and their parents were benefited. In the current session i.e. 2022-23, about 190 were benefited along with their parents.

2. Free Health advice by health experts:

Often health experts visit the college to guide the students regarding health related issues where the students often lack the basic knowledge. The information is precious for the girl students who often hesitate to share their health related issues with others. The experts asked the girls to share their health related problems with their parents without any kind of hesitation and if needed they must also consult the doctor immediately. The importance of regular exercise and proper sleep is also explained to them. They are explained about the importance of maintaining proper diet plan and give preference to nutritious food.

Suggestions for menstrual related problems are also provided to the girl students. The students are also told to keep in mind the importance of personal hygiene. The experts advised the students to keep a personal medical kit with some medicines for emergency.

1. Free Corona vaccination within college campus:

Government of India took all the necessary steps to ensure that we are prepared well to face the challenge and threat posed by the growing pandemic of **COVID-19** (Corona Virus). The most important factor in preventing the spread of the Virus locally was to empower the citizens with the right information and taking precautions as per the advisories being issued by Ministry of Health & Family Welfare.

The best way to prevent and slow down transmission is to be well informed about the disease and how the virus spreads.

In this mission of the government, our institution worked in the frontline by spreading awareness, providing masks and vaccination to students. Our **NSS** volunteers participated with full enthusiasm in this mission and took oath for spreading awareness among people regarding corona.

In our college campus, vaccination was given to the girl students having age above eighteen years and later it was provided to the girl students below eighteen years.

4. Awareness about importance of Yoga:

A healthy and strong body is like an ornament. If you are healthy, you will be able to study properly, go on excursions or participate in competitions. Due to the gift of Yoga given by ancient Sages, you can remain healthy and lead a long life. Yoga supports the healing process and thereby makes a significant contribution in health care, education, sustainable development issues.

Our institution celebrates Yoga day on 21 June every year with full enthusiasm and motivates the students to lead a happy and healthy life. During the corona period, when people were suffering from isolation and

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depression, our institution started online yoga classes for students to make them fit and healthy.

Experts of Yoga are called by the institution from time to time, to guide our students regarding the accurate positions of Yogic aasanas.

Conclusion:

Our institution has always worked hard to make the girl students physically and mentally strong. In this process of empowering the girl students, the institution has called many experts to guide the students regarding health related issues. We believe in the social and moral upliftment of the students. Good health is the basic need for any kind of upliftment so our institution works on this aspect with full vigour.
